A word to share...



This past Sunday, Andrea chose "God of the Ages, Whose Almighty Hand" (or "God of Our Fathers") as the opening hymn for the worship service. As I was putting together the bulletin, I began thinking about this Christian/national hymn. Certainly, the grand scale of the tune (with its great introductory trumpet fanfare), and the strong, powerful wording of the hymn, immediately came into my thoughts.

So, what about it? It is a hymn that crosses many denominational lines and is included in many, many Christian hymnals. The hymn is typically placed in the 'National', 'Attributes of God', or 'Patriotic' section of

hymnals. The more I thought about it, the more I wanted to know about its origins...and what has made it so popular...in our churches as well as at national events.

This hymn confirmed, yet again, that good hymn writing and composition, regardless of how it came into being, transcends the ages, and reaches beyond our denominational walls.

A brief history: Daniel Crane Roberts, an Episcopal priest living in Brandon, VT, wrote the words to commemorate the small town's celebration of the 100th anniversary of the Declaration of Independence. A few years later, he entered the hymn into the general Episcopal convention as they were seeking new hymns for their new hymnal project. He was very unsure of the hymn's quality and entered the competition anonymously. To his surprise, the hymn was chosen to be added to the new hymnal.

While the hymnal was still in progress, George William Warren (a hymnal committee member and church organist in NYC), was on the planning committee for the centennial celebration of the U.S. Constitution. He recalled this hymn, suggested it to the committee, and it became one of our great National, and Christian, hymns.

Okay, so what? The hymn is grand, its big, its about the greatness of Our God, but the hymn encompasses so much more. Let's look at just a few phrases that describe God's other attributes...

-- 'Be Thou our ruler, guardian, guide, and stay', (3rd verse): We're asking God to be our spiritual ruler, but also our guardian (like our father and mother), guide (our mentor), our stay (someone who supports, sustains and props up).

The hymn turns from grand to prayerful in the 4th verse:
'Refresh Thy people on their toilsome way' (...God is our Living Bread in

our difficult lives)

'Lead us from night to never ending day;' (...this is our hope of eternal life)

'Fill all our lives with love and grace divine,' (...we ask God to give us another aspect of His personality, and we're asking God for His riches...

Jesus Christ, His son)

and then...

'And glory, laud, and praise be ever Thine.' (...because God gives us all things, we will always glorify Him)

Wow! In these days of uncertainty (every day seems so much worse than even two years ago) in so many aspects of our lives...COVID, security, jobs, terminal or chronic illness, pastoral transition, the world order, the list goes on and on... We can take heart that our God is SO great, SO mighty, yet SO gracious and loving to us, His people. All we need to do is call on Him.

We can and must rest in Him (our lives depend on it), we can have comfort in our hearts that He sent His son, Jesus, to help us...to be our friend, the caregiver of our lives, present and eternal. Our faith, our hope is in God and our Savior, The Lord Jesus Christ.

Save the date ... OCTOBER 10TH ... FLU SHOT CLINIC ... (immediately following the worship service)

We are again administering flu shots this season. A good rule of thumb is to space vaccines one month apart. With this in mind, we will give both regular and high dose (age 65+) shots on Sunday, October 10, following the worship service. This allows spacing before many are eligible for the COVID-19 booster shot.

- Wear a short-sleeve shirt;
- If you have not had a flu shot in previous years, please bring your insurance card, or if your insurance information has changed.
- Ages 5 and over are eligible for the shot.
